Dundas Street Litter

Recognizing the growing problem of litter on Dundas Street along the bank behind the townhomes, back in the Spring the Association took proactive steps to address the issue for the benefit of all residents.



The concern was raised with both the townhome management company and the City. Thanks to persistent follow-up, we were able to ensure the area was cleared of rubbish and restored to an acceptable condition. Recently however, litter does appear to be accumulating again so keeping the garbage situation under control will require ongoing effort and another request to the management company.

Advance Green Assessment

In response to a request from the Association, the City (Traffic Systems and ITS Business Unit) assessed whether an eastbound advance left-turn phase at the intersection of Dundas Street at King Forrest Drive/Redstart Drive was warranted.




Field studies were conducted at the intersection of Dundas Street at King Forrest Drive/Redstart Drive during the morning and evening peak traffic periods on October 14, 2025. As well, a review of the collision history at this intersection was undertaken.

Based on the above information, the Traffic Systems & ITS Business Unit did not recommend the implementation of an eastbound left-turn arrow at this time.

Snowplow Damage

The sidewalk snowplows have already been out a couple of times this year. One of the most common issues caused by sidewalk snowplows is accidental damage to the grass sod found on either side of the walkway.

Because the snow can hide boundaries, snowplows may sometimes scrape or tear up small sections of grass, which is often city property. In some cases, edges of the sidewalk may also be affected. While these incidents are not intentional, they are a known risk during our Canadian winters.



The good news is that the city will arrange for repairs to be made during the summer season, when the ground is thawed and conditions are best for restoration work. Whether it's patching up torn sod or fixing a chipped sidewalk edge, crews are scheduled to address

reported issues as part of ongoing property care.

If you notice any sidewalk or sod damage after winter snow clearing, we encourage you to report it so repairs can be arranged. Please use the following links to submit your report directly to the city: Report Sod Damage or Report Sidewalk Damage.

What to know about Snow!

Having already had a few relatively mild dumps of the white stuff, here is a timely reminder of what to expect from the City and the part we all need to play in ensuring our neighbourhood receives a good snowclearing service.

Two major changes this year are that the City will be **clearing windrows** - the pile of snow left across the end of your driveway after the plow has cleared the road - **and also sidewalks!** To enable them to do this and to completely plow our streets, it is important for us to keep the road and the lower portions of our driveways clear of cars when there is a snowfall otherwise they cannot be cleared. So please:

- Don't park on the street, sidewalk or at the end of your driveway
- Move garbage and recycling bins away from the curb
- Remove sports equipment, yard decorations and other items from around your driveway entrance and sidewalk

Note that rules around street parking and temporary parking permits change during the winter so please make sure you are aware of these to avoid getting plowed in, fined or towed. More info can be found on the City's website here.

Glen Erin Trail

Some of you will have noticed that the pathway behind the Erindale Secondary School playing field is in need of repair where the surface has broken up and also appears to have subsided in places. Our Association has contacted the City regarding repairs needed for the pathway, which is a popular section of the Glen Erin Trail used by many in our neighbourhood for walking, cycling, and enjoying nature.



At present, little progress is expected until after the winter. Rest assured, the Association will continue to follow up on this issue and will keep the neighbourhood informed with updates as they become available.
